DVDs:

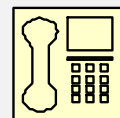
2 night loan, overdue fine 50 cent per day, NO RENEWALS

- *View and print electronic exam papers.

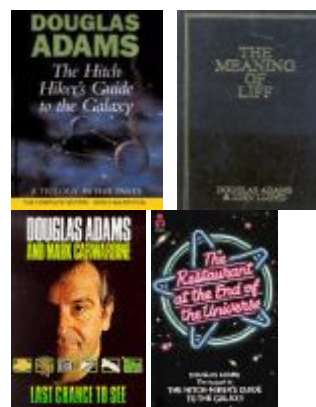
A life well read. Nigel Jennings shares his reading habit s...

Q1. What book or author was your favourite as a child?
