What is Referencing?

Referencing is the process of acknowledging the sources you have used in writing your assignment.



It gives the reader the information to access your sources so that they can verify your arguments and the evidence on which it is based.

What Needs to be Cited?

The general rule is that **all** information used in an assignment must be cited, including any information that you have taken and put in your own words.


Exceptions:

- Your own thoughts
- Facts which are common knowledge

Citation required?

	Citation required	No Citation required
Indicate a fact that is common knowledge		
Present results from your own research (e.g. surveys, experiments)		
Quote directly from a published source		
Put in your own words another author's theory or ideas		
Use an image from the web		
Use statistics or facts and figures from another source to back up your work		
Copy and paste a figure or table from another source		

Referencing in Context



When referring to an author(s), explain their position and your critique or comment on it

Acknowledge sources used

- Briefly, in your text
- In full, at the end

Citation Styles

There are many accepted styles to present your references. Each style is a system with consistent rules about how to display a citation (including punctuation, font, capitalization and so on) within your text, footnotes, and the reference list.

Sample Styles:

Harvard (author-date)

MLA

APA

Chicago (numbered footnotes)

Harvard Style

- An in-text citation, that provides the following information:
 - The name of the author(s)/ editor(s) of the source
 - Year of publication
 - AND, sometimes, the page numbers you have used material from

<u>AND</u>

 A reference list that provides full details of the sources you have cited in your text

Example: Book with one author

According to Lancaster (2020) building good habits during your studies will ...

Reference list

LANCASTER, T., 2020. *Avoid plagiarism*. London: SAGE Publications.

Rules for Harvard



Author and year in citations (Put in page reference, if using quotation or citing a figure/table)



Use 'title', if you can't find an author



Use n.d., if you can't find year



Full stop after citation (if at end of sentence)



Use 'et al' for 4 or more authors

Examples of In-Text Citations


- There seems to be a correlation between students' use of the library and high degree marks (Stone & Collins 2022).
- Kelly and Morris (2021) offer a convincing argument ...
- The research of Dalton et al. (2019) has been challenged by ...
- Barnard (1998, p. 11) defines visual culture as "everything that can be seen".
- According to a recent report, flu jabs are as important as travel vaccines (Department of Health 2011).

When to Reference Sources



- **>** Quoting
- ➤ Paraphrasing
- **>** Summarising
- ➤ Using an idea from your previous work
- ➤ Using an idea from someone else's work

Quotations



Short quotations (<30 words)

Enclose the exact words in single or double quotation marks

Place the citation in

brackets after the quotation or after the author's name in the sentence

Long quotations (>30 words)


Indent the quotation from both margins and type in a smaller font. Do not use quotation marks.

Place the citation in brackets after the quotation or in the introductory sentence.

Paraphrasing



Used to rewrite text in your own words

Used to shorten a longer statement, but keep the main ideas

Used to clarify meaning

Giving credit to the original author of the idea

What is not Paraphrasing

Changing

Changing a couple of words

Deleting

Deleting a couple of words or phrases

Rearranging

Rearranging the order of words



How to Paraphrase



You must:

- Change the structure of the original passage
- Change the words
- Give a citation / reference

Paraphrasing Example



Original:

"Information has never been in short supply, but with the advent of new technologies and media, most notably the Internet, vast and often overwhelming amounts of information now deluge individuals around the clock" (Bellanca and Brandt 2010).



Paraphrase:

Due to advancements in technology, particularly the internet, we are now constantly bombarded with information (Bellanca and Brandt 2010).


Summarising

- Provide a brief statement of the **main points** of an article, webpage, chapter or book
- Only list the **main topics** or concepts, with most detailed information left out

Example:

Nevertheless, one important study looks closely at the historical and linguistic links between European races and cultures over the past five hundred years (Harrison 2007).
